Center for Leadership Development RECEIVES \$11.6 MILLION GRANT FROM LILLY ENDOWMENT

Since 1977, the Center for Leadership Development (CLD) has provided enriching programs to supplement and reinforce tens of thousands of African American and minority youths' learning and developmental experiences. The organization will soon have the ability to reach many more youth with expanded program offerings thanks to an \$11.6 million grant from Lilly Endowment Inc.

THE GRANT WILL BUILD ON MORE THAN 40 YEARS IN CENTRAL INDIANA TO DO THE FOLLOWING:

- Increase program participation from 4,000 to 6,500
- Establish satellite locations in high crime, low income areas across Marion County
- Expand CLD headquarters by 15,000 square feet to increase service capacity
- Create an endowment to ensure long-term sustainability for CLD
- Establish on-campus groups, services and mentoring support for CLD students attending college and universities

"Lilly Endowment is proud to have supported CLD since its very beginning because of its commitment to the character development, leadership formation and academic and career success of African American and other minority youth," said N. Clay Robbins, Lilly Endowment's chairman, president and CEO. 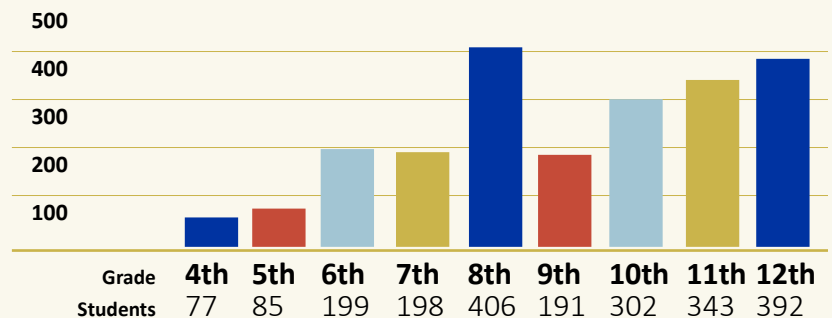

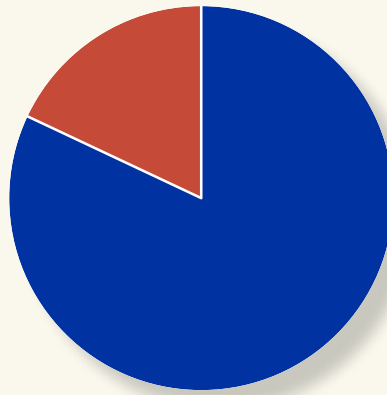

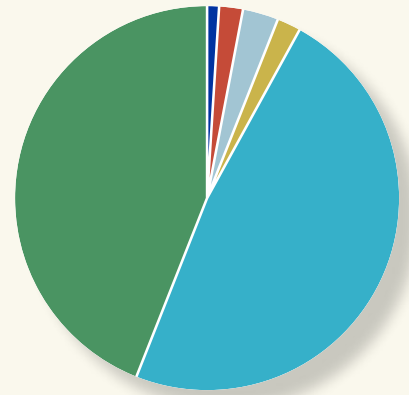
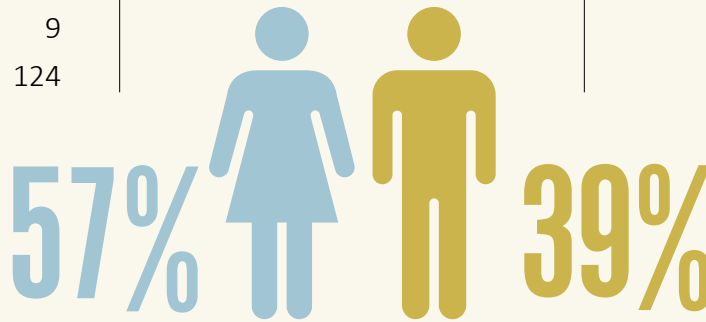

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

JR. SELF-DISCOVERY/CAREER EXPLORATION PROJECT:

GRADES: 4 ● 5 ● 6 ●

Designed for our younger students, this foundational eight-week journey of self-discovery and interaction focuses on effective communication and study habits and inspires development. It helps elementary school youth recognize and overcome barriers to academic success.

IMANI BOOK CLUB:

GRADES: 4 ● 5 ● 6 ● 7 ● 8 ● 9 ● 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

This six-week summer reading program is designed to improve literacy and nurture an appreciation for the written word. Participants engage in written and oral activities, including journaling, vocabulary logs presentations and debates.

PRECIOUS MISS:

GRADES: 6 ● 7 ● 8 ●

This program, designed for young ladies only, is led by African American female professionals. This all-girl program was created to help students discover and value themselves, strengthen character, explore friendships and relationships, develop positive body image and increase self-esteem.

PROJECT MR. (MALE RESPONSIBILITY):

GRADES: 7 ● 8 ● 9 ● 10 ●

This “guys only” program is led by African American professional men and focuses on responsibility, how to recognize and defuse pressures, setting goals, making healthy lifestyle choices, working cooperatively with peers and adults and effective communication.

SUCCESS PREP:

GRADES: 8 ● ENTERING INTO 9TH GRADE

This preparatory program is geared towards students leaving 8th grade and is the ultimate high school readiness program for participants and their parents/guardians. Students learn how to study, take notes, prepare for tests, make wise decisions, understand resources and apply their academic abilities. Included is a thorough overview on the importance of academic success and the preparation required to realize the highest level of achievement.

SAT PREP:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

This 4-week program walks students through each section of the SAT and teaches them about the test format, how to prioritize test taking procedures, how to make the best use of test time and provides directions for the test segments.

ROLE MODEL/ADVISOR EXPERIENCE:

GRADES: 8 ● 9 ● 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

This one day initiative allows participants to hear directly from top African American professionals in various careers and professions who volunteer their time to share details of their education, work ethic, daily routine, personal challenges and opportunities. This experience is made possible by area physicians, RNs, financial planners, teachers, pharmacists, counselors, accountants, engineers, IT professionals and others.

SELF-DISCOVERY/CAREER EXPLORATION PROJECT:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

As the flagship program of CLD, this 13-week experience helps students gain insight into personal, educational and career goals. This rigorous and transformative program helps answer the questions – Who am I?, Where am I going? and How do I get there? It also includes discussions, role play, activities, and presentations. Completion of this program results in the graduates becoming CLD Alumni. It is a prerequisite to four other programs including College Prep, Emerging Scholars, Business Orientation Project and Rawls Scholars Medicine Initiative

COLLEGE PREP:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ● AND COLLEGE FRESHMEN

During the eight-week course, sessions led by collegiate guest speakers and current college students range from exploring the benefits of a college education and the admission process to overcoming obstacles along the way and graduation. This program also has a four-week parent/guardian course and includes special breakout sessions for rising college freshmen.

PROGRAMS AND INITIATIVES

EMERGING SCHOLARS:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

In this one day initiative, students and their parents come together and learn about various scholarship opportunities, including those provided by CLD's college and university partners. Participants gain insight on essay writing, resume tips, scholarship eligibility, the application process and preparation for higher education experiences. Students and parents also have the opportunity to speak one-on-one with CLD college and university partner admission representatives.

BUSINESS ORIENTATION PROJECT (BOP):

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

GRADUATES OF SELF-DISCOVERY

This 11-week program, in partnership with I.U. Kelley School of Business, pairs students with minority business owners, entrepreneurs and professionals for real-world business perspective. Sessions include career planning, how to operate a business, write business correspondence, interview and speak publicly.

RAWLS SCHOLARS MEDICINE INITIATIVE:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

GRADUATES OF SELF-DISCOVERY

This 6-week program offers a rare opportunity to closely interact with medical students and professionals through our Rawls Scholars partner, Eskenazi Health. Participants shadow trauma services staff, tour Eskenazi Hospital and gain an insider's perspective of the I.U. School of Medicine.

COLLEGE PREP CONFERENCE AND COLLEGE FAIR

This day-long college readiness experience provides students, parents and mentors with an interactive conference that includes breakout sessions facilitated by experts from K-12, post-secondary education, and the NCAA. Sessions are specifically designed for students and student-athletes in grades 8th-12th, and their parents. Families attending the conference leave feeling better prepared to ask the most beneficial questions in regard to making the right college choice

PARENTS CHAT:

ANY PARENT OR GUARDIAN OF A CLD STUDENT

This program is a series of parent exclusive sessions dedicated to finding honest answers and helpful resources. Parents benefit from trusted information on issues ranging from sexuality, abstinence, navigating social media, college and major selection, financial literacy and more.

CORPORATE AND COMMUNITY COLLABORATIONS

BOWEN ENGINEERING INITIATIVE:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

GRADUATES OF SELF-DISCOVERY

Presented in partnership with Bowen Engineering and Purdue Minority Engineering Program, this one day initiative introduces participants to the scope of possibilities in engineering, entrepreneurship and science related careers.

CHASE YOUTH EMPLOYMENT SUMMIT:

GRADES: 10 ● 11 ● 12 ●

GRADUATES OF SELF-DISCOVERY

COLLEGE PREP INSTITUTE

The College Prep Institute (CPI) is the CLD's college and career readiness center. In 2019, CPI provided over 2,000 African American youth and families with the guidance, care and confidence needed to overcome the challenges that prevent them from excelling academically, attending college and obtaining a post-secondary education. Highly qualified licensed guidance counselors are available days, evenings and weekends to students and parents free of charge. The CPI is ready to provide reading, math and career assessments, college searches, financial aid literacy, information on internships and referrals to internal and external community resources.

COLLEGE PREP INSTITUTE

- **CPI Vision:** the vision of CLD's College Prep Institute (CPI) is to create one of the nation's leading community-based resource centers that strategically improves high school and college graduation rates, while building a culture of scholarship and learning among African-American youth.

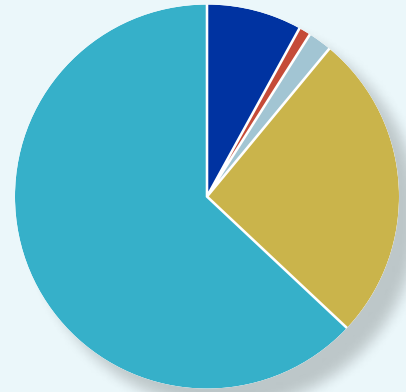

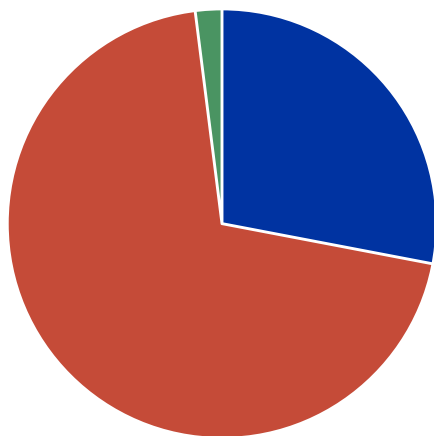

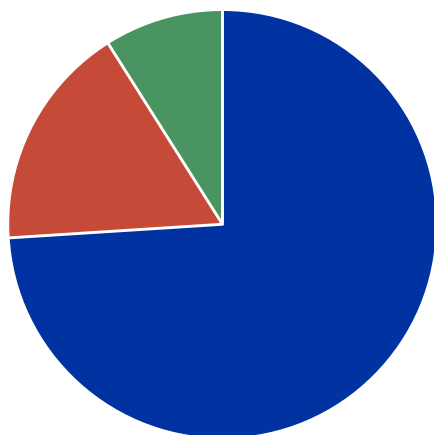
